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The aim of this collection is to show stamps and postal history items used at Mafeking, during the siege in the Anglo-Boer war (October 14,1899 - May 17,1900)

Since the town of Mafeking was cut off from the outside world and normal means of communications severed. native postal runners (Kaflir) were entrusted with the hazardous task of carrying the mail through the enemy lines surrounding the town, running the risk of being shot if caught. Many were shot and for this reason compensation for this dangerous occupation was high, finally £25 per run.

Initially the message conveyed by the runners were official communications only, but at a later stage private mail was carried

According to the published rates in the "Mafeking Mail", post carried by the **Southern Route via Kimberly** was 6d and post carried by the **Northern Route via Bulawayo** was 1s, while the rate for the **local post** (Mafeking town and their forts), carried by the "cadets", was still 1d and 3d

For mail to Europe a third way was used "via Beira" a harbour in the coast of Portuguese East Africa, to be reached after Kimberly

In view of the dangerous nature of carrying the mail, it is not surprising that soldiers were expected to pay the full rate for their mail instead of the usual concessionary rate


This notice appeared in the "Mafeking Mail" on 22 March 1900 (the 161st day of siege). "Private letters will in future be sent by the Intelligence Department, by runners in batches of 30 (letters, not runners) at a time, first come, first served the Communications will be despatched in the order they are received."

Note that the Southern Route was much more dangerous, with a greater risk of not getting through

To satisfy the high cost of the service stamps were overprinted with higher value and a set of new stamps were locally produced (the Mafeking blues)

The hero of Mafeking, was Colonel Robert Baden-Powell

It was during the siege that young boys who had already been formed into a cadet corps, were first used by the military for running messages and errands. They proved so useful that Baden-Powell conceived the idea of founding the Boy Scout movement.





BACKGROUND

At the outbreak of the Boer War, the town of Mafeking, located near the frontier of the Bechuanaland Protectorate and also its administrative capital, was an important railway town on the Cape Town - Bulawayo line. With a population of 9.800, of whom 1.800 were of European origin, Mafeking was prepared for the ensuing siege by the Boers with 1.200 British and Cape troops being stationed there to fortify and defend the town.

On October 12th, 1899 (the day after the declaration of war), Boer forces under the command of Cronje (8.000 men and well equipped with artillery) began the siege, after crossing the Cape border and marching from Zeerust.

"Mafeking besieged" surcharged on stamps was a strong warning for the whole British Empire.





In retrospect, there is little doubt that, had the far superior Boer forces made a determined offensive attack on the town, Mafeking would have fallen.

Z.A.R.: "Zuid Afrikaansche Republiek" surcharged over Cape stamps, clearly shows the initial success of the Boer forces.









They also issued their own cancellations (not stamps) with the name "Hoofd-Lager, Z.A.R. - Mafeking"



Lord Nelson 18th century 6 lb. naval gun. During the siege of Mafeking the barrel was found and mounted on a wagon base. Cannon balls were made in the Railway workshop. The gun's range was 3.000 yards.



At the beginning of the siege good use was made of an armoured train. A few days after war broke out a party of Boers was observed approaching from the north. The train set out, and, supported by some troops, a useful small action resulted which heartened the besieged and discouraged the enemy. But this could not be repeated often, for soon the Boers had cut the railway line on each side of the town.

A small railway line was built across the town. Baden-Powell had an armoured train from the Mafeking railyard loaded with sharpshooters and sent up the rail line in a daring attack right into the heart of the Boer camp, followed by a safe return to Mafeking.



MAFERING, 2ND APRIL, 1900.

It is with great regret that the Colonel Commanding has to announce the death yesterday, in the Boers' Hospital, of Capt. Crewe, Rhodesian Regiment. He died of wounds received in action on the 31st ultimo. This officer was, in the Matabele War, 1896, recommended for the Victoria Cross for gallantry in action.

The first innie substitution

The first issue, which was overprinted in fancy type, has varieties with double or treble overprinting, they were not however supposed to have been issued and were withdrawn as discovered, but some specimens found their way into collectors' hands. An inverted surcharge error can be found on the 1d. on ½d. orange and the 6d. on 3d. purple on yellow exists with double or inverted overprint, whilst the 3d. on 1d. lilac is known with double overprint and the 1/- on 4d. green and brown with double and treble overprints, and also double, one inverted.

Fortunately, the forgeries that exist of these overprints are more or less easy to recognise provided one knows what to look for and below are a few hints on how to recognise the genuine. Firstly, the word "Mafeking" should measure 12½mm. long, in the forgeries it is usually 13mm. Secondly, the word "Besieged" should measure 11½mm., not 12mm. Thirdly, the "B" of "Besieged" should extend to roughly the centre of the "M" in "Mafeking" and the cross bar of the "A" should tilt upwards to the right. On the forgeries the "B" of "Besieged" is usually found to the left of the "M" of "Mafeking" whilst the "A" has a straight cross bar.

It should be remembered also that the words of the genuine are clear cut, evenly spaced and in a straight line, whilst the forged overprints usually show the type uneven and of somewhat ragged appearance, with alignment of the full overprint displaced.





SURCHARGED STAMPS

The military authorities purchased, from the Postmaster Mr Howat,. at their full face value, the entire supply of stamps in the Mafeking Post Office and the Head Office of Bechuanaland Protectorate.

In order to assist in the defraying of the costs of the runners, an increased postal rate had to levied for the carriage of private letters which was duly announced through the medium of the "Mafeking mail":

- 1/- per ½ oz. for mail carried by the Northern Route via Bulawayo
- 6d. per ½ oz. for mail carried by the Southern Route via Kimberly
- Postal rate for Local post unchanged
 - o 1d. per 1/2 oz. for delivery in town limits
 - 3d. per ½ oz for delivery at outpost and forts

To give effect hereto it became necessary for the Military Administration to surcharge the stocks of stamps purchased from the Post Office. The stamps had to be overprinted with the wording "MAFEKING BESIEGED" and the surcharged rate. The printing was carried out between 23 March - 3 May 1900.

The original stamps before overprint



The normal larger letters, which were cancelled between 23 March to the middle of May 1900 in the bombproof underground Post Office, had, in part, if they were addressed to the outside, to wait until 17 May 1900 when they could be forwarded further.

SURCHARGED STAMPS

The military authorities bought the entire supply of stamps from the Mafeking Post Office.

At this time Mafeking was the administrative capital of the Bechuanaland Protectorate.

Townshend & Sons, local printers, overprinted the stamps with either double or triple their face value, as required. The overprint "MAFEKING/BESIEGED" therefore exists on stamps of the Cape of Good Hope, British Bechuanaland and Bechuanaland Protectorate These administrations recognised the stamps only on mail originating from Mafeking.

The "forme" of the "set up" consisted of six subjects only. The basic stamps were printed in panes of 240 (20 rows of 12 stamps) and the overprint was therefore applied a row at a time. The sheet had the selvedge removed from the outside; it was then split into 6 rows of 20 stamps ready for overprinting.

Only the 1s on 4d British Bechuanaland was an exception as these stamps unoverprinted came in sheetlets of 20, thus only 5 subjects were applied at a time. There are at least four separate printings as indicated by different spacings of the overprint. The 16 overprinted stamps came with two different overprint styles: fancy letters and sans-serif letters.

The One penny and Threepenny were intended to be purely local in their use, a postal service having been arranged in the town and between it and the outposts; but as a sufficient number of each of those values could be (and were) used together to make up the higher rates, they can be classed as ordinary postage stamps, though issued at one place only, available either together or with other values, to frank letters overseas (i.e. to United Kingdom).

The values used during the siege were One penny, Three pence, Six pence, One shilling and Two shillings and all were made by overprinting available stamps of Cape and Bechuanaland overprinted with a new higher value and "MAFEKING/BESIEGED"

This cover was not handled by the postal authorities at Mafeking during the Siege as witnessed by the absence of cancellations and the request that it be registered at base. Conceivably it was carried by a private runner at the instance of a reporter or merchant. It could have been dispatched immediately after the Siege using prepurchased Siege issues. Although these were military issues they were accepted by the GPO, Cape Town, as valid for ordinary civilian use until November 1900.










The "Mafeking Blues" refer to the 1d. bicycle stamp, 3d. Baden-Powell stamp and £1 Siege Note, which were produced by the photographic ferroprussiate process.

About 800 sheets of 12 stamps each, of the 1d. were issued. The 3d. came in a narrow and wide format. About 500 sheets narrow format and 200 sheets wide format were issued.

In March 1900, only 683 blue banknotes of £1were issued, signed by R. Urry, Manager of the Standard Bank and Capt, Greener, the Chief Paymaster of the garrison.

This stamp depicts Sgt. Major Warner Goodyear, a twelve-years-old lad, who was the epitome of the ideal Boy Scout, in uniform with delivery pouch on his bicycle.

Dr. Taylor, the official "printer" of the stamps, took first a "reduced" photo of the accepted design. From the negative thus obtained, 12 prints were made and pasted on a sheet of cardboard, arranged in 3 rows of 4. He then photographed this arrangement, thus obtaining finally by contact a 12 subject negative glass plate. A contact print was made from this negative on "blue print" paper and thereafter washed and developed in a similar way to an ordinary photo print.

There were 3 printing plates used to produce the 9.476 stamps of this issue (approximately 800 sheets of 12 stamps each).

The first printing, from Plate 3, accounted for 400 sheets.

A second printing, from Plate 2 accounted for 334 sheets.

A small third printing, from Plate 1, probably done just prior to the relief, accounted about 68 sheets only.

The stamps were perforated by Townshend and Son" in Mafeking, they used a Line Comb perforator.


Because they operated under harsh wartime conditions, some errors were made, even the position of the perforating was not always centred.

The "designer" of the "Bicycle" stamp, Dr. W.A. Hayes, incorporated his initials ("W" and "H") in the design of the stamp. This will found in the space separating the value tablet from the portion representing the original photograph.

The "broken plate" variety of 1d "Bicycle" shows the "break-up" of the value tablet. A number of white lines extend vertically into the value tablet and are joined irregularly at the base close to the bottom perforations.

The stamps are from the bottom row of the third plate and are, in all probability, the final printing to have been made from that plate, and seem to have been brought into use only very shortly before the siege was lifted.

What caused this variety? The emulsion on the glass negative underwent a process of expansion (through the application of heat or otherwise) causing it to thicken on those portions of the glass negative plate where these lines occur.

Thus on printing from this glass negative plate white lines appeared at the base of the stamp.







Broken value tablets

There are also differences in the bar characteristics of the three printings of the stamp. The stamps can be divided into three main groups and their relative positions on the sheet are as follows:

- Stamps with blue bars at the top are from the top rows of the sheet
- Stamps with bars at the bottom are from the bottom rows of the sheet
- Stamps without bars are from the centre of the sheet



Mafeking Relieved after 220th day of Siege.

(By Telegraph. -Per Eastern Company's Cable Received and Published May 19 noon.)

London, 18 May, 10:30 p.m.—(Reaters Agency.)
—The enthusiasm in London is universal and unbounded owing to the receipt of a Reuter's telegram announcing the relief of Mafeking, which was posted at the Mansion House, at half-past nine o'clock this evening. The news spread like wild fire and rassed along the Ministerial benches and afterwards through the House of Commons, amid a general hum of satisfaction.

The streets are crowded, and by a quarter to ten there was wild cheering and waving of flags. The police were obliged to divert the traffic round the Mansion House, which is brilliantly illuminated, and a portrait of Col. Baden-Powell displayed.

Mafeking was threatened by the Boer forces under General Cronje on Friday, 13th October, and there was severe fighting four miles from the town when the enemy's loss was reported to be 53 killed, many doubtless from the explosion of two trucks of dynamite which were carefully shunted down the railway line in the direction of the approaching enemy. Noxt day there was fighting with two armoured trains and the Boers fled out of range. On Monday 16th the first shells fell into the town, the hospital being struck three times, the fifteenth shell struck Reislo's Hotel, but although over fifty shells were fired there was little damage and no loss of life. Since that day Mafeking has been closely invested, and though called upon to surrender has stoutly delied assault to the last. Cronje got so utterly sick of fruitless bombarding that he forsook the job and went South to Magersfontein, saying; he could fight men, but the garrison of Mafeking were devils.

Mafeking were devils.

His successor Commandant Sayman has had no better success. One of the most notable incidents of the siege took place on the night of Friday October 24th, when the enemy were attacked in their trenches, with the bayonet, causing them heavy losses, and forcing them to evacuate Signal Hill, our loss was six killed and nine wounded.

On Friday 31st. October the enemy made an assault upon the town; it was gallantly attempted and gallantly repulsed, but their loss was so great that up to the date of relief no serious attempt was made to carry the position, desultory bombardment and the loopes of starving the garrison into capitulation were the only means used, and failure marks their end.

The latest events of striking interest are dated:—
March 23.—Boers evacuate a strong position known as "The Brickfields," after three months' fighting. Their attempts to mine the trenches with nitro-glycerine was discovered, and the firing current wires cut.

March 31.—Col. Plumer's forces got within six miles and in sight of Mafeking, but had to retire before overwhelming numbers, the enemy being two to one of our forces.

April 10.—Fearfully heavy bombardment by Boer ordnance, and 68 shells from big siege gun, but resulting only in one casualty. The bread ration further reduced.

The siege will ever stand as amongst the most gallant in British history, and we think a special medal should be struck to commemorate the bravery of the Military and Civilian garrison.

As for the principal Hero, whose portrait we reproduce above, there is no distinction too great to be conferred upon him.






