

## Forthcoming U. S. Issues

Steel Industry Stamp Due for New York on May 22

Postmaster General Summerfield announced that the special stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Steel Industry in America would be given first-day sale May 22 at New York City. This will coincide with the sixty-fifth general meeting there of the American Iron and Steel Institute.



#### Oklahoma Statehood Stamp Announced for June 14

Mr. Summerfield announced March 17 that a special three-cent stamp would be issued to commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of Oklahoma Statehood. The stamp will go on sale on June 14, 1957, the opening day of the Oklahoma Semi-centennial Exhibition. The design of the stamp will show a horizontal arrow superimposed on a solid outline map of the state of Oklahoma. The arrow will represent the frontier days of Oklahoma prior to statehood in 1907.

### School Teachers Stamp Schedule for Philadelphia July 1

Mr. Summerfield also announced that the stamp in honor of the School Teachers of America would be first placed on sale at Philadelphia July 1, during the centennial convention of the National Education Association.

The designs and colors of these stamps will be announced later.

### September 3

A new 30-cent Special Delivery United States postage stamp will be placed on first day sale in Indianapolis on Tuesday, September 3, 1957, Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced August 13, 1957.

The stamp is 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally, electric eye perforated and issued in sheets of fifty. It will be printed by rotary process and the color will be maroon.

The design of the stamp illustrates a special delivery letter being delivered hand to hand by the messenger to the recipient. The overall stamp forms a dark background for the hands, the letter, and the wording. The lettering "Special Delivery" dominates the top of the stamp. The denomination "30c" is placed in the lower left corner, and in the lower right corner appears the wording "U. S. Postage." All lettering is in white-face Gothic.



The stamp commemorates the feat of an Austrian Alpine team that successfully assaulted the Himalayan peak, Gasherbrum II, on July 7, 1956. Issued July 24, and valid for postage from July 27. Edwin Mueller.

BELGIUM, 1957, July, King Leopold I, commemorative:

Designed by Wappers, engraved by Malvaux, and printed at l'Atelier du Timbre at Mailines by heliogravure.

The stamps, were issued on the occasion of the 126th anniversary of the arrival of King Leopold I in Belgian territory. He was founder of the current Belgian derritory, his ascension to the throne following the successful revolution of 1830.

Designed by M. Ebinger and engraved by M. Janssens, and printed by Atelier du Timbre, Malines, from copper-plate engravings.

The stamps, as are other produced for the Boy Scouts this year, commemorate the founding of the Boy Scout movement fifty years ago by Robert Baden-Powell, born Feb. 22, 1857, and who was a soldier in British African campaigns. Upon his retirement at the age of fifty, he founded the Boy Scout movement, the first Boy Scout camp being held on the island of Brownsea in England. Baden-Powell died Jan. 8, 1941.



GREAT BRITAIN, 1947, Aug. 1, Boy Scout Jubilee Jamboree, commemoratives. (See first page of New Issues):

2½d magenta red, Queen Elizabeth II and Scout insignia

4d blue, Queen Elizabeth II and swallows in flight 1s3d, green, Queen Elizabeth II, and globe

The 2½d was designed by Miss Mary Adshead, 4d, designed by Patrick Keely; 1s3d, designed by W. H. Brown.

For the record, here are the official descriptions of the stamps:

2½d. magenta red, designed by Miss Mary Adshead, shows a rope coiled to make a rolling hitch surrounding the Boy Scout badge on the left, and a three-quarter face portrait of Her Majesty the Queen on the right.

4d. blue, designed by Mr. Pat Keely, depicts swallows flying towards the centre of the stamp, in which is shown a portrait of Her Majesty the Queen, thus symbolising Boy Scouts gathered together in this country—the home of the movement. A light ornamental frame surrounds the Queen's portrait to suggest a cameo locket.

1s.3d. green, designed by Mr. W. H. Brown, shows the world encircled by a compass and by a ribbon carrying the dates 1907-1957. It illustrates the theme that the Boy Scout movement is one of the greatest international organisations of the world and reaches all points of the compass. The arrowhead of the compass was adopted for the Boy Scout badge by Lord Baden Powell because it showed the way.

THE ARTISTS. There is no information on any restrictions placed upon the artists who submitted designs for the series nor as to what choice was placed before the Postmaster-General's Advisory Panel, which consisted of The Lady Sempill, A. R. C. A., Sir Francis Meynell, R. D. I., Sir Leigh Ashton, Mr. J. Fitton, R. A., Sir Gordon Russell, Sir Kenneth Clark, Sir John Wilson, Bt., and the Hon. Sir George Bellew, Garter Principal King of Arms.

Of the three artists whose designs were chosen, Miss

Mary Adshead (Mrs. Stephen Bone) has had designs accepted for earlier British stamps, namely, the 2½d. of the U. P. U. 75th Anniversary series, the last 2s.6d. and 5s. of the King George VI definitives, and the design for the current 8d. to 11d. stamps. The 2½d. of the Jamboree stamps is her work, and in it one can see a "family resemblance" to the two high-value King George VI stamps.

Patrick Keely, designer of the 4d. Jamboree stamp, is a newcomer so far as stamps are concerned. He is a Governor of the Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts, a Fellow of the Society of Industrial Artists, and has done work for various governments and public authorities here and abroad. Whether his swallows will really make a summer for him the future alone will tell.

William H. Brown, who was responsible for the 1s.3d. stamp, is a 29-year-old staff designer with Harrison & Sons Ltd., and in that capacity has designed several stamps printed by his firm for overseas governments. This is his first British stamp, and it is, one suspects, inspired by the 1s. value of the 1949 U. P. U. issue, which it resembles in many ways. Mr. Brown was trained at the Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts.

Each artist has made use of the same Dorothy Wilding portrait of the Queen, one of those officially approved at the beginning of the reign.

COIL PRINTINGS. In order to facilitate the servicing of the many thousands of covers which the Post Office had accepted unstamped in advance of the release of the stamps, a special machine was built by Vacuumatic Ltd. of Dovercourt, Essex. This machine will dispense stamps from specially printed coils of 4,800 of each value of the Jamboree stamps. The method will be to spray the appropriate part of each envelope with water before bringing the stamps into position for affixing to the covers.

The Post Office has stated that the coil stamps will have exactly the same upright watermark as the stamps printed in sheet form and, as far as at present is known, that there will be no way of distinguishing between the two printings except by obtaining a coil strip of such a length that it could not have come from a sheet. If the machine dispenses the stamps in horizontal strips, seven stamps would be evidence of the coil printing. If the stamps are dispensed in vertical strips then 21 stamps will be necessary to prove the printing.

Although, according to a Post Office spokesman, the coils will be available on demand at the G. P. O. in London, it is unlikely that many individuals will purchase them. Specialist collectors may be able to acquire examples of coil leaders from the trade, but even these will be somewhat difficult to obtain, especially so far as the 1s.3d. value is concerned, since a complete coil of this value alone will cost £300, and few dealers are likely to take these for the sake of selling the leader strip.

CANCELLATIONS. There are two cancellations with a Jamboree slant. On July 1 a slogan cancellation was introduced at several main offices, and remained in use until July 31. It is illustrated here. It was not possible to obtain the slogan on covers with the Jamboree stamps themselves as the slogan was due to be



However, at the Sutton Park site of the Jamboree camp, a special post office was operating, and all mail posted there received the special commemorative cancellation of which no details were available at the time of writing. The Jamboree cancellation was in use from August 1 to August 12.

PERSIAN GULF OVERPRINTS. The three Jamboree stamps are being overprinted for use in the Persian Gulf Ports. Bahrain, Kuwait and Qatar will each have their own series with the territory named in the overprint in addition to the local currency. The values will be: 15 naya paisa on  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d.; 25 naya paisa on 4d.; 75 naya paisa on ls.3d. Overprinted stamps showing the local currency only will be available for use in Muscat and Dubai. Stamp Collecting, London.

Early in September an Inter-Parliamentary Union Conference 4d. commemorative stamp will be issued in the design of the current 4d., but with "Forty-sixth Parliamentary Conference" inscribed at the sides (this will be engraved on the cylinder and will not be an overprint). There will also be a new 6d. aerogramme with stamp showing Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament overprinted "Forty-sixth Parliamentary Conference". The aerogramme will also be available unoverprinted during September and will replace the present design. The engraving of an additional inscription on the cylinder is a new departure in British stamp issues. A similar process was used when the words "Royal Visit" and the date were inscribed on the plates of some of the colonial stamps in 1953-54. The use of a pictorial design on the aerogrammes was foreshadowed by the Postmaster-General gast year when dealing with Lord Elibank's proposals for pictorial definitives.

The cameo profile of Canova is not a duplicate of the vignette used for Vatican City \$90. The sculpture "Hercules and Lica" is in the National Gallery of Antique Arts, Rome. "Venus Victrix" is depicted in the modelled figure of Pauline Bonaparte, wife of Prince Borghese, and is now in the Villa Borghese, Rome.

Antonio Canova, a great Italian sculptor, was born a Recognity of Prince New 1, 1757. His father

was a stone-cutter, and the boy's ability at sculptor was marked at an early date. He was modelling enduring works of art as early as 1773. His work was known, in his own lifetime, far outside the confines of Italy; in fact, he executed a statue of George Washington for the Raleigh, N. C. State House! To his genius as a sculptor, he added the gifts of a diplomat. During Napoleon's rule, he modelled busts of Napoleon and various members of his family. Then, following the French collapse, he successfully negotiated the return of art treasure that Napoleon had looted from Italy. For this latter feat, Canova was made Marquis of Ischia by the then-reigning Pope. He died on Oct. 13, 1822, at Venice.

The recent Ovid stamp (The American Philatelist, August, 1957) bears cryptic letters, "S.M.P.E.". These are the initials for "Sulmo mihi Patria est" (Sulmona is my native land), a line from one of Ovid's verses. It is spelled out in full on the commemorative cancel used at the town of Sulmona on the occasion of the stamp's issue.

marked paper, as has the 2001 "coin" stamp. The recently-issued 61 coin stamp exists with erroneous first-day cancel bearing date of May 27, 1956 instead of 1957. At the recent Milan Fair, experimental coil and booklet stamps were sold, of 251 denomination. It is reported that they cannot be differentiated from the regular 251 coin stamps, except that the coils can be had in strips of more than ten stamps. Also, in preparing the coil and booklet stamps, a proof of the stamp was made for experimentation, identical with the

These are the first of the new Malayan definitive issues to be placed on sale. As reported in *The American Philatelist* (May, 1957, p. 636, and illustrated, June 1957, p. 714), fifteen stamps are to make up the set, 6c, 12c, 25c, and 30c, common to all the states and to Malacca and Penang—national stamps—the remaining eleven denominations to be in the same basic pictorial designs for the other states, except Johore, with the exceptions that borders will indicate the individual State or Settlement.
