
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## U. S. To Issue Refugee Stamp

ing and numerals by George L. Huber.

Collectors may send addressed covers and cash or money order remittances to cover the cost of stamps to be affixed, to the post-master, Washington 13, D. C. Requests for first day covers should not be accompanied by orders for unused stamps or for covers of other stamps.

The Washington, D. C. post office reports that collectors are grouping their requests for first day covers of stamps scheduled for release in Washington early in 1960. In many instances the accompanying postal money order or certified check embraces all stamps to be affixed, creating an accounting problem.
